I spoke of Nicholas Stoltzfus to a young man at the Farmers Market in Wyomissing, he told me he is only interested if Nicholas left him something in his inheritance!

Somewhere near a million descendants living today have some genes, if nothing else, from Nicholas. Oh, yes, many know of more that we got from the early Stoltzfuses. But not all of them have been happy to be a Stoltzfus. Some even changed their last name to Proudfoot! (and some changed the spelling for practical reasons, like Stolfus, for instance!)

I remember my grandmothers' spirit as they sang the hymns, and read the Bible as well as the Martyrs Book. It is like a stream of meaning, refreshing me as I continue on the journey of life.

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Why and How we get there

Lydia and I recently moved from Elizabethtown to a cottage at Fairmount Homes, near Ephrata. This reduces the travel to The Stoltzfus House.

In this move we went “about” 65 MPH on routes 283, 30 and 222. On Farmersville Road we found carriages moving under 20 MPH.

One visit to the Reading area coincided with the Flying Farmers convention. These were her (and her late husband, Jerome's) friends, so when her 90th came along they were there to join her!

Pud Sam Stoltzfus says Abner would be pleased to see the progress. He would feel rewarded for the time he took with the Brinkmans. Even before his death in 2002 he realized joyful progress.
